
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INAUGURAL PARTNERSHIP WITH NIGERIA: ACHIEVEMENTS & TRANSITION

Born Free's first country partnership began in 2012 with the Government of Nigeria. This partnership set the foundation for our investment model for catalytic talent: working directly with governments to recruit, hire, train, and embed catalytic talent directly into government in order to spark improvements and accelerate program results.

The partnership supported an exceptional team of 12 people, led by **Dr.** Charity Chenge and Dr. Lilian Anomnachi-David, which focused relentlessly on sparking change toward eMTCT at both the federal and state level. They served as teammates alongside their government counterparts to tackle challenges related to goal setting and work planning, program data quality and quantity, and to troubleshoot key areas of operations that had fallen off the radar of Nigeria's response to HIV.

These efforts contributed to impressive program results. From 2012 to 2014, the proportion of women living with HIV initiated on antiretroviral (ARV) prophylaxis increased by 60%. This is a massive change in a system that has many challenges. Though Nigeria's journey to eMTCT continues, this jump start will be remembered as a critical step.

Over the past 3 years, the team also spearheaded several initiatives that will continue to scale - operations support services for early infant diagnosis, difficult and deep cleansing of the country's health program data, and HIV service delivery among private medical practices.

Born Free's formal role as convener and manager of this partnership came to a close in December 2015, but the team in Nigeria will remain, with continued support from some of our existing private partners. We are proud and grateful for our lead private partners and are excited for this partnership to serve as a platform for years to come.

















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REFLECTIONS FROM DRS. CHARITY CHENGE & LILIAN ANOMNACHI-DAVID, PMTCT TEAM LEADERS, NIGERIA

Nigeria has made an incredible journey since our work with Save One Million Lives and Born Free began. In 2012 when (then) Minister of State for Health Dr. Muhammad Pate set out to build a results-oriented team in government focused on outputs and outcomes instead of inputs, we knew it could be game-changing. We also knew it would require breaking some of the traditional rules of engagement, supporting our government colleagues from behind the scenes, and relentlessly focusing on what the data is telling us about our system's performance.

Now, we have much to be proud of. Nigeria's health system and PMTCT program is improving and we have embraced the energy and hope that comes from our first democratic Presidential election.

What you aren't able to see as well are the individual lives we've touched. In the words of Dr. John Markson, of the Akwa Ibom State AIDS Con-

trol Program: "Data elements are no longer just abstract numbers required by the State Ministry of Health. Health workers are using their program data now as an indicator for assessing their performance and contributions to the health of infants." He also noted that, "for the first time, state program officials have direct access to their own program data and are able to review and analyse their performance to feedback into program improvement processes."

We thank all of our partners and collaborators for your support, without which none of this would have been possible. We look forward to building on the foundation we have set together in the years ahead.

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PARTNERSHIP WITH THE GOVERNMENT OF KENYA

Inspired by the catalytic talent investment model that Born Free pioneered with the Government of Nigeria, in 2015, together with the Government of Kenya Born Free launched a partnership to build a Rapid

Response Team for the elimination of mother to child transmission.

This partnership utilizes the model of embedded catalytic talent. The team, jointly recruited by Born Free and the Ministry of Health, works directly with government counter-parts at the sub-national (county) level to accelerate the pace toward elimination while encouraging a culture of rigorous management and high performance.

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REMARKS FROM DR. MARTIN SIRENGO, HEAD OF KENYA'S AIDS CONTROL

The Ministry of Health of Kenya is proud to collaborate with Born Free. This partnership was a result of a robust and collaborative evaluation of the areas where investment would create the most significant impact. Our analysis pointed toward leaky points along the PMTCT continuum of care and the need for a rapid mechanism to address these gaps. The "Rapid Response team" is a highly mobile team of Technical Advisors, which was designed to provide this rapid mechanism.

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REMARKS FROM DR. MARTIN SIRENGO, HEAD OF KENYA'S AIDS CONTROL (Cont'd)



The core of the eMTCT response is **engagement with county government and health facility leadership**. Working behind the scenes and in collaboration with the counties, the Rapid Response team has helped form County Specific PMTCT Technical Working Groups with specific focus on the **use of data for decision making**. Through the support of the team, counties have also been empowered in data granulation (analysis). Further, the team supported a mapping out of implementing partners to improve the synergy of working relations.


At the first ever national PMTCT stock taking in April 2015, it was identified that 17,000 HIV positive women who had contact with the health system missed antiretroviral treatment and could not be accounted for. As a result, a nationwide campaign was launched, led by the Rapid Response team., resulting in a reduction

of the number of "missed opportunities" by **nearly 40%** and an **extensive effort to trace missed women and children**.

In 2016, we will continue to interrogate the PMTCT cascade to identify further obstacles to eMTCT. We expect the

catalytic mechanism already in place through the Rapid Response Team to mature into more accountability towards eMTCT and further reduction of the mother to child transmission rate.
