# Examples of our impact and initiatives

We're proud of the results we've achieved together with our implementing partners that contribute to our overarching mission of a safe, healthy and fair world. We look forward to witnessing the progress made by these initiatives in years to come, to help further meet our collective long-term goals. The challenges we face across the globe are multifaceted and therefore need intersectional responses.

## **Accelerating Universal Sexual Reproductive Health and Rights**

Universal access to SRHR is essential if countries are to reach their intended development goals. One of the ways CIFF is accelerating universal access to SRHR is through our strong focus on self-managed contraception, particularly self-injectable contraceptives. In 2023, self-injectable contraception use increased significantly, reaching 15% of global contraceptive use, up from 1% in 2019. The Step-Up platform, implemented in partnership with FCDO and MSI Choices, reached 1.7 million young women across six African countries, with half choosing long-acting contraceptive methods.



#### **Preventing and Treating Child Wasting**

The Child Nutrition Fund (CNF) is a CIFF-funded initiative aimed at supporting the financing of large-scale wasting prevention and treatment. Good progress has been made over recent years thanks to its rapid growth. The CNF focuses on essential government-led actions for the early prevention, detection and treatment of child wasting. Over 10 countries have invested \$15 million of domestic funding to unlock the 1:1 match and, in turn, they have received \$30 million worth of ready-to-use therapeutic food (RUTF) through the CNF commodities match. This will ensure approx. 600,000 children can be reached with this lifesaving treatment.





### **Ending School Age Hunger**

Our nutrition portfolio continued to grow in 2023, encompassing different types of intervention, from strengthening health systems, to the growth of nutrition in maternal and newborn care, to great strides in the rollout of Multiple Micronutrient Supplement (MMS). A key highlight from last year was our collaboration with Food4Education to expand a ground-breaking school feeding programme model in Kenya. Within 8 months, Africa's largest 32,000ft Giga kitchen was constructed and operational, capable of providing 60,000 meals a day.

### **Building Climate Philanthropy**

CIFF has continued to prioritise climate action, as we recognise that it is one of the greatest threats to children today and in the future. In 2023, Climate Lead and Sir Christopher Hohn co-hosted Climate Shift alongside other renowned philanthropists, an event held to inspire emerging climate funders. Climate Lead's bespoke advisory support to philanthropists has resulted in significant new funding for the climate community.



#### **Expanding Global Digital Health**

During India's G20 Presidency, CIFF supported the GIDH, an initiative spearheaded by the Ministry of Health & Family Welfare and managed by the WHO. Through digital transformation, GIDH will improve healthcare service delivery by leveraging digital health innovations and solutions across the world. This network and platform will facilitate the implementation of the WHO's Global Strategy on Digital Health 2020–2025.
